THE TRUE VINE

Beloved in the Lord,

Happy Summer to you all! I hope that all of you are having some opportunity to rest and to spend time with your families, and perhaps even to travel. I pray that the Lord will sustain and preserve you in all that you do, and bring you safely back once again. Even as the summer passes, we are of course deep in preparations for August and September, which will see the return of our Festival and the resumption of our regular ministries in what we pray will be a fully post-COVID reality. We look forward to being together with all of you for the feast of Koimisis/Dormition August 15th, and of course for the Festival September 9-11, the return of Catechism School September 25th, and all the other many events and celebrations that characterize our community life together.

As we look forward to them, however, it is good that we reflect on what the highest priorities are for us as Orthodox Christians. Festivals and ministries, and other such events, generally consume most of our thought and energy when it comes to the Church, for the simple reason that they are urgent and immediate. They are high on the priority list because they are the next task to be completed. They are good and blessed things to do (if sometimes rather stressful), but it can become a problem when the urgent things fill our lives to the point that we no longer have time for the important things.

We see this in other areas of our life as human beings, that we tend to prioritize what is most urgent, and can inadvertently neglect truly important things along the way. The important things do eventually become urgent, but when they do, it is usually because something essential has broken down through neglect. None of us can deny that refueling our vehicles "feels" more urgent than getting the oil changed. But failing to fuel up will not damage the car, and is easily fixed, while failing to change the oil will destroy the engine. And of course, every parent who finds that their work is encroaching on their time with their children knows this struggle intimately.

It is therefore necessary that we consider carefully what are the important things in the Church, what is and must be at the center of our life in Christ. And the clear answer to this, from our own experience and from the long history of the Church, is the Eucharist, celebrated in the Divine Liturgy each Sunday without interruption since the Lord's Resurrection. It was for the sake of this central reality that the founders of our community worked so hard to establish not just a cultural center, but a Church. It is only in the celebration of the Eucharist that we can truly become what they hoped and prayed we would be, and find the strength and the camaraderie that will sustain us in the many urgent matters of parish life.

We reached this conclusion in last month's article, and I promised there that we would spend the next few months examining "what it is that we are doing when we come to the Divine Liturgy." We understand that we need to approach the Church and the Chalice with purpose and intent, but it is less clear in what direction that purpose and intent should incline. We know, on the one hand, that the Divine Liturgy is not something that WE do, but something that the Lord does; that is why it is the DIVINE Liturgy. It is the work of the Lord, our God, for us, His people. And yet we also know that we have a part to play, that the Liturgy cannot happen if no people are present; if the priest is there, but is alone, he cannot even begin the Liturgy. So what, exactly, is our part, our role, our "job" in the Liturgy?

We begin to find an answer if we remember what "Eucharist" means: it is the "giving of thanks." The Lord our God is active in the world, present in our midst, accomplishing our salvation, at all times and in every place. And on every Lord's

At The Annunciation Greek *Orthodox Church parish, we* continue to live out the ancient faith of Orthodox Christianity in a way that is relevant to today. We practice unity in essentials, diversity in non-essentials, and charity in all things. We welcome all to come and worship the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit with us as it was done in the first days of Christianity, and has now continued for over 2,000 years in our Lord's One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Orthodox Church.



Day (every Sunday), the Faithful people of God gather in the Church to offer Thanksgiving to Him for these things; it is this Giving of Thanks that is our job. There are two steps that are necessary for this Thanksgiving, however. We must first *receive* the gifts that God is giving to us, taking hold of them with all our being, body and mind, heart and soul. And then we must *offer* Thanksgiving to Him for His goodness to us. Our Christian life exists between these two poles, of receiving God's gifts, and offering Thanks for them.

The question of how we receive the Gifts of God is fairly simple to answer. Everything that we do as Orthodox Christians, starting with receiving Holy Communion and the other Sacraments, and continuing with prayer, Scripture reading, fasting, and even almsgiving, are all oriented toward receiving the good things that God is giving to us, or to letting go of the things of the world so that we are able to receive God's gifts.

The question of how we give thanks is a little bit more difficult, if only because we often have the sense that thankfulness is a matter of how we feel and perhaps of what we say to express how we feel, and not so much a matter of what we do. But if we pay attention in the Divine Liturgy, we will hear repeated reference to "sacrifice," which is to say, to what we offer to God in thanksgiving for what He has given to us. And what we offer to Him is nothing less (or more) than ourselves.

The role of the Laity is, perhaps, defined by this. The order of the Laity is not just composed of, but IS, the people whose God is the Lord, Who offer *themselves* to Him in thanksgiving for His good gifts to us. If we can understand this central truth, that to stand in the pews on Sunday is not just to watch or listen to OTHER people worshipping God, but to fulfill an essential role ourselves, then we will have made a good beginning.

We will continue to consider this matter next month. For now - have a blessed July!


