THE TRUE VINE

Beloved in the Lord,

It is a joy to greet you as we near the end of our Lenten journey and approach the great Feast of our Lord's Pascha. The schedule of services for Holy Week has been sent out, and may be found once again here in the *True Vine*; we hope to see all of you in the course of these sacred and saving days. *Καλὴ ἀνάστασις! A blessed Resurrection to all!*

Informational Booklet Project

We continue our work to create an informational booklet for our parish, a guide to the services and sacraments of the Church, and how our Faithful can request the grace and blessings of the Lord throughout our lives. It will also provide a glimpse into the Priest's Prayer Book, and what our clergy are able to offer, including prayers and services beyond the basics of Baptism & Marriage. In this space, then, we will publish draft versions of the planned elements of this booklet, for the information of the Faithful, and also to help us identify any changes that need to be made before we go to press.

In February, we discussed the 40-Day Blessing of a newborn infant, and then in March we paused our progress through the Sacraments to outline the services and observances of Great Lent and Holy Week. As we approach the Feast of Pascha, it is very appropriate that we continue with the Sacrament of Baptism, by which we are initiated into life in Christ in His Holy Church.

Baptism - a Personal Pascha

Baptism in the Orthodox Church in inextricably connected to the Baptism of our Lord Jesus Christ. His baptism in the Jordan at the beginning of His ministry is a clear sign and token of the purpose and reality of His Incarnation. In His baptism, He immerses Himself in our created nature, and blesses and heals and transforms it, and leads us up out of the waters of baptism into new life in communion with Him. His baptism is also a clear prophetic image of the culminating moment of His Incarnation, His death, burial, descent into Hades, and Resurrection; it is precisely in these events that we commemorate during Holy Week and Pascha that the Lord completes His assumption of our whole nature, and heals and transforms it. In His death and Resurrection, He joins us in the uttermost depths of our exile from Him, bridges the chasm between us and Him in Himself, and leads us out of darkness and into His marvelous light.

This is itself a fulfillment of the ancient sign and reality of the Passover, in which the Lord delivered the Hebrew people when they were enslaved in Egypt, and led them Himself through the depths of the abyss into the wilderness, which became for them the path out of darkness and death and slavery, and into the Land Promised to Abraham long before. What was



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revealed to the Hebrew people in Egypt in a sign and shadow, as God delivered them from slavery, our Lord Jesus Christ shows to us in full in His death and resurrection, as He leads us out of death itself and into everlasting life with Him.

This is why the word for Christian Easter is Pascha. Pascha is, put simply, the English spelling of the Greek word $\Pi \acute{a} \sigma \chi \alpha$, which is itself the Greek version of the Hebrew word Pesach...which means Passover. Jesus Christ is our Passover, our deliverance from slavery to sin and death and darkness and hopelessness, and it is in our own baptism is that we each participate in the Lord's life-giving salvation. Thus, in the baptism, we sing: "As many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ."

The connection between the Old Testament Passover, Christ's Pascha, and our own baptism, is made still more clearer when we realize that the Old Testament Passover was completed by the crossing of the Red Sea...even in the Old Testament, the Lord delivered His people from slavery by means of water. So our baptism, no matter what time of year it happens, is our personal Pascha, our direct participation in the Lord's Passover, delivering us from the slavery to this world into the glorious liberty of the children of God. And just as the Lord did not just save adults during the Passover, so too in the New Covenant He calls entire families to be members of His Body, the Church, and partakers in His life, and citizens of the Kingdom of Heaven in the New Creation. Hence we continue to baptize infants born to Christian parents, from the beginning of the early Church to the present.

Holy Week, Pascha, and the Baptism of Adults

With that said, we cannot understand the services of Holy Week without comprehending this deep connection between the Passover, the Lord's Pascha, and Baptism. From the earliest days of the Church, the ideal and preferred day for baptizing new Christians was on the eve of Pascha, on Great and Holy Saturday, so that the new Christians would celebrate Pascha by being passed over themselves by the Lord from death to life through the waters of baptism, during the Vesperal Liturgy that we celebrate Holy Saturday morning. In the present day, we continue to observe this tradition in its essence, although we have transferred the preferred day for baptism one week earlier, to the Saturday of Lazarus.

Nonetheless, although that is preferable, especially for adults who are entering the Church, we can schedule baptisms at any time of year, subject to the normal schedule of the parish and the pastoral needs of each individual. Those who are interested in entering the Church as adults should speak with the parish priest, and he will provide guidance in how they should prepare to enter the Church, and what will be involved. Please note that, as a general rule, the process of catechesis should take several months, and ideally not less than a year.

Planning an Infant Baptism

In the Orthodox Church, the normal time for baptizing a child is soon after the 40-day Blessing, ideally around 3 months old. The baptism should certainly be completed before the child is 9 months old, so parents should begin to plan their child's baptism as soon as the 40-day Blessing is completed. The question of the date of the baptism is important, but there is one detail that must be resolved before a date can be set, and that is the identity of the godparent.

In the Orthodox Church, the Godparent is the one essential person at the baptism (besides the child and the priest, of course). The role of the Godparent is to commit to seeing the child raised in the Orthodox Christian Faith, and therefore, the Godparent *must* be an Orthodox Christian in good standing with the Church. When parents are selecting a Godparent, then, they should look for someone who attends Church regularly, who is known to live a pious and moral life, so that they may be confident that, in the Godparent, they have someone who will be a partner with them in raising the child in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

It is best that this decision be made in consultation with the parish priest, as there are certain circumstances that are common in modern life that temporarily prevent a chosen godparent from serving (the most common of these is divorce). The priest can help parents navigate the decision, and can advise them on how various impediments can be resolved; this conversation is also a good opportunity to finalize the date of the baptism.

When planning a baptism, then, parents should discuss godparent options and potential dates together, and then

fill out the informational forms for baptism (available from the Church office or on the Church website), submit them to the Church office and to the parish priest, and at the same time request a phone call or meeting with the priest to finalize those plans. We do ask that parents not actually ask anyone to serve as godparent before they have confirmed that they are in good standing with the Church.

Once the date and godparent have been confirmed, it is required that the parents and godparents meet with the priest prior to the baptism, so that he can explain the sacrament and address any outstanding concerns. The priest or Church office will schedule this meeting; it is generally held virtually, but may be held in person if it is more convenient.

The next sacrament to discuss is Chrismation, which is closely connected to the Feast of Pentecost. In the meantime - $K\alpha\lambda$ 0 Πάσχα!



MEET OUR TEACHERS: KEITH & MARIA McFARLAND

How long have you been attending Dayton Annunciation? If you attended a different church in the past, which one and where? Maria was born in Cleveland and attended Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church in Tremont, Cleveland. In 1981, after graduating from Wittenberg University, she joined Annunciation Dayton.
