# EASTERN ORTHODOXY & A CHANGING AMERICA

Society is changing religiously. According to a March 31 Gallop survey, church membership is below 50% in America. Christians are now in the minority in our country. In addition to this, it remains to be seen what church attendance will look like once communities are allowed to fully reopen without restrictions. On Sunday mornings, will families get ready to come to Divine Liturgy? Will they choose to live stream? Will they sleep in and watch the service later? Will they skip church altogether and not engage with God at all? According to Barna Group, one in three Christians who attended church regularly pre-Covid has now stopped. What if this represents a permanent loss to faith communities?

For American Orthodox Christians, the numbers in church membership are drastically declining across the board. The Census of Orthodox Christian Churches reported from 2010 to 2020 the number of American Eastern Orthodox adherents dropped 17% from 816,653 to 675,765, and the number of regular attendees declined 14% from 212,212 to 183,020. In the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America, 22% of its members regularly attend church and our jurisdiction saw a total decline in membership of 22% between 2010 to 2020. This is a staggering loss and all of these statistics are pre-pandemic. As such, it seems plausible that the losses to all Eastern Orthodox jurisdictions and parishes in America will be even greater now.

Where do we go from here? While not a complete list of collective culpability, I believe it would be good for American Eastern Orthodoxy to acknowledge four things: 1) This pandemic has revealed a great wound and division in our society that needs to be worked on. 2) While not completely indicative of American Eastern Orthodoxy today, in the past, poor catechism and a general lack of knowledge about our faith have taken a toll. 3) Outside interests and pressures reveal certain truths about ourselves that we don't want to look at or engage in. 4) Some of these changes are going to stay with us for many years to come. They did not happen overnight and will take time to be remedied. Thankfully, there is a solution to all these challenges if we are willing to "seek and find" answers.

The question we should all be asking is "Why?" Why am I here? Why does the Church exist? What is the mission of the Church? What is my responsibility to God, His Church, and to others? The need for change is obvious. The "why" and "what" we need to change and conform towards is what must become paramount. The answers are in the Bible and the teachings of the saints. In the end, it's about our priorities. Do we want to know our God? Do we want to worship Him as He asks to be worshipped? Have we made excessive vacationing and sports more important than God? Have we made material pursuits more important than our relationship with God? Do we work so much daily and pack our lives so full that we no

# YOUTH MESSAGE: CHRIST IS RISEN!

Christ is Risen! As young people in the church, it can be confusing as to why all of these people we talk about at church, other than Jesus Christ, are so important. At the end of this month, on June 29th, we celebrate two very important people in Christianity, Saints Peter and Paul. This feast highlights for us how important anyone can be for the Church and all Orthodox Christians to come after us. This feast day shows us that we are all called to serve the church in ways best suited for our God given talents. We also see, on this feast, that sinning isn't something that has to keep you away from God. We see if you are truly sorry for the things you have said or done you too can do great things in the name of God.

You see, while both Sts. Peter and Paul are two of the most well known Saints of the Church, they also both turned their back on Christ during their lives. You may remember when Jesus had been arrested people in the crowd pointed to Peter saying he was with Jesus, and he lied and said he didn't 3 times! When Jesus needed support, Peter was not there for Him. Before St. Paul even became a Christian, he spent his time trying to shut down the Church. Paul persecuted the Christians, even killing some of them. But both Sts. Peter and Paul confessed of their wrongs and went on to be some of the greatest leaders of the Church and devout followers of Christ. This is important for us to remember, that no matter



how big of a sin we commit, if we confess our sins to God (through the mystery of confession) we will be forgiven and even used by God to grow His Church.

Another important point we can take away from the feast of Sts. Peter and Paul is how there is a place for everyone to work for the Church. This doesn't mean that everyone is meant to be a Priest, Deacon, or Pastoral Assistant, but that whatever it is we ARE good at can be used to benefit the Church. When we look at St. Peter, we tend to remember him as the leader of the Apostles and the one who founded the church in Rome. He only is credited for writing a couple short Epistles and is not known for his theological orations. St. Paul, on the other hand, is known more for his teachings and writings as he travelled the known world and planted churches from the Middle East, to Asian Minor, and Europe. He is credited with writing 14 books (epistles) of the New Testament and the converting of countless people to the Christian faith. While these two Saints went about things very differently (even disagreeing with each other at least once) they worked towards a common goal - bringing people to Christ. That is how we should look at our parish here in Dayton, and any other parish we may find ourselves a part of in the future. We all belong, and we all have talents that can serve the Church so we should welcome everyone!

So as we celebrate the feast of Sts. Peter and Paul at the end of the month, and whenever we reflect on these two magnificent Saints, let us remember these two important examples they set for us. No sin is too great to keep us away from Christ and His Church and it takes all types of people with many different skill sets for the Church to run properly, so welcome everyone!

The birthstone for May - the emerald - a symbol of rebirth, is believed to grant the owner foresight, good fortune, and youth. Emerald, derived from the word "smaragdus," means, quite literally, "green" in Greek.

June has three birthstones! Pearl, moonstone, and alexandrite. The original biblical birthstone of June is a topic of much discussion and no one can seem to agree on what that was. Alexandrite was discovered in the Ural mountains of Russia in the 1830's. It is also the traditional gift for a 55<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary.

### Checks and cash and online payments—Oh my!

Please remember that when you send in a check, leave cash at the office or make any type of payment online....you also need to make a detailed notation of where you want those funds to go such as: 2021 Stewardship, In Memory of (Memorial Donations), Purchase of items through the Church Store, Altar or Memorial Flowers, Cemetery Plot Purchase, Facility Fees for Events, General Donation, etc. Are you leaving cash? Please have someone give you a receipt and leave a copy of it with your cash. It makes my job so much easier and I thank you.

I've had a few members ask me questions about memorial donations. You may make a memorial donation in memory of an individual at any time. We gather the names and addresses of those that have donated and we notify the next of kin that a donation has been made in their loved one's name so that the family can take care of sending a thank you card.

#### Here are some examples of typical donations and how they are used:

- If your donation states: "In Memory of –", that money goes to the general operating fund and can be used for the operating expenses of your parish (salaries, maintenance, supplies, electricity, etc.).
- If your donation states: "In Memory of Memorial Fund Donation" those funds are restricted. They cannot be used for the general operating expenses of your parish.
- If you donation states: "In Memory of Legacy Fund Donation" those funds are restricted. They cannot be used for the general operating expenses of your parish.

Unless your donation specifically shows that you want it to go to the Memorial Fund or the Legacy Fund, the donation will go to the General Operating Fund. It is up to each donor to decide how they want the funds to be disbursed and accounted for. Make sure you write it down so that I can place it where YOU want it to go.
