THE TRUE VINE

Beloved in the Lord,

As we write this, the parish is entering upon the last intense stages of preparation before our first full Greek Festival in three years. The entire campus has been humming with activity for weeks with the preparation of the various pastries and other foodstuffs, and every room in the building is dedicated to this great annual effort of our community. As we approach the final days and hours, and the Festival itself, I extend my deepest thanks to everyone who has participated in any way, large or small, in this blessed labor. Whatever the outcome, we have already tasted, time and again, the great blessing of Christian fellowship in working and serving together, and we entrust ourselves and the results of the Festival to the Lord, Who has given us to one another and to our city and community. May it be blessed!

If you have not yet had an opportunity to take part in the work of the Festival, then there are still many opportunities. If you can offer any volunteer time, please contact the Church office; if you cannot, then please still plan to attend, and invite your friends, coworkers, and neighbors. As we open our doors and our hearts to this city in which we live, let them see us at our best, laboring and laughing together in concord and in joy, in peace and in love, so that we may bear witness to the joy and the grace of the Lord Who has brought us together.

Along with the Festival, of course, we are preparing to resume all the other ministries of the Church: Catechism School, Greek School, GOYA, HOPE/JOY, and Young at Heart are all busily getting ready for the start of the new Church Year. Adult Catechism classes have already resumed; the Choir & Parish Council never even paused. After more than two years of disruption from COVID, we are poised to finally return fully to parish life.

In April and May, we spoke of similar themes, as we reflected on the parish's 100th anniversary, and urged ourselves and all of you to take that opportunity to renew our devotion to the Lord and to His Church, and since that time, we have been reflecting in this space on how we may go about doing that, starting with the center of our life together, our worship together in the Church, and how our worship must be rooted in a reality of thanksgiving. This "giving of thanks" is, of course, what "Eucharist" means, and is at the heart of our life in Christ. But it is easy to say this, and much harder to put it into practice.

Thanksgiving, of course, begins with a recognition that we have received a gift. This part is easy; every morning when we wake from sleep, see the sunrise, and smell the fresh morning air, we have an opportunity to recognize the gift of life and existence that the Lord has given to us. Every time we lift up our voices and hearts in prayer, we have an opportunity to confess the good things that God has done for us. And every time we enter the Church, we both hear and participate in the proclamation of His many mercies to us, all that He has done to sustain us in life and restore us to the love and glory for which He created us. If we ever question what is the "point" of the first 40 minutes of the Divine Liturgy, it is precisely this recounting of the many things that God has done for us, for which it is right and proper that we should give thanks to Him.



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At The Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church parish, we continue to live out the ancient faith of Orthodox Christianity in a way that is relevant to today. We practice unity in essentials, diversity in non-essentials, and charity in all things. We welcome all to come and worship the Father, Son, and *Holy Spirit with us as it was* done in the first days of Christianity, and has now continued for over 2,000 years in our Lord's One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Orthodox Church.



But this recognition and recounting is only the beginning. As all of us know, the natural and proper response to a gift, to a gracious act from someone else, is to respond in kind. When someone else opens up to us, offering something of themselves to us, it is instinctive and normal that we should reciprocate, offering something of ourselves to them. This can become a matter of guilt and obligation, but it need not be so, and should not be so. If what we have received is indeed a good gift, then our hearts are moved, and we desire to respond, not out of obligation, but as a free movement toward still greater intimacy with the giver. If we do not feel this natural movement of our hearts, then it is usually because the gift is not in fact a good gift, or because our hearts and minds are distracted, so that we do not recognize its worthiness and value. So when we come to the Church, our first responsibility is to attend to the good things that God has done for us, and strive to recognize the graciousness and love of God for us. This is often the purpose of the sermon, to spark in us a greater awareness and understanding of what the Lord has done for us, to help us hear and see the things that we have heard and seen all our lives with new eyes and ears, to soften our hearts and move our souls toward the Lord.

It is only once we have attended to these things that God has done for us, as recounted in the Psalms and hymns, Scripture readings and sermons, that we continue with the actual offering of the Eucharist. What we offer at this point is something solid and tangible, not just our feelings, but the actual fruit of the labor of our hands, bread and wine that become the common offering of us all in the Great Entrance. As we continue from that point, we recount in general terms everything that God has done for us from the beginning of time up to the present moment, and exhort ourselves to a real and significant offering of ourselves to the Lord in thanksgiving for the love and salvation that He has given to us. This is the purpose and significance of the proclamation of the Creed, and of the Anaphora, the Offering Prayers of the Priest which immediately follow the Creed. Finally, we recount the Lord's institution of the Eucharist, speaking ourselves the words that He spoke, assuring us that what He offers to us is not just some intermediate grace, but Himself, flesh and blood, God uniting Himself with humankind. And then the Priest, on behalf of all of us, lifts the Bread and Wine that we have offered, representing our entire shared life, and offers all of us to the Lord, on behalf of everyone and everything that exist in this universe.

And thus, as we recount God's goodness to us, we ascend to meet Him, offering ourselves to Him as the first fruits of the entire universe, and in that meeting, He gives Himself to us once again in the very gifts that we have given to Him, so that it is not just the Bread and the Wine of our offering that become the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ. Rather, it is we ourselves, who offer ourselves to Him in thanksgiving for all that He has done for us, who become the Body of Christ in this world. And this is why we do not merely stand afar and watch in awe at the Consecration of the Gifts, but rather we dare to approach and to receive the Lord, directly and in person. We know and confess that the Lord is good, but we do not simply repeat this truth; rather, we run to Him to offer ourselves to Him in thanksgiving for His goodness, and then we taste and see that the Lord is truly Good, and we are refashioned, becoming one with Him, the Good One Who saves us and all the world.

But this is not the end; the Liturgy does not conclude with Holy Communion. It concludes with us being dismissed from the Church, not because the Lord wants us to leave His presence, but because He is now present within us, and is sending us out into the world, back to our lives, our homes, our jobs, our struggles, to carry Him into the world, even into the darkness, so that His light may shine on all.

This, then, is the great mystery of the Eucharist, of our Thanksgiving to God for all that He has done for us. In offering ourselves to Him as living sacrifices of praise and thanksgiving, we are invited to become a part of His good work of salvation in this world, instruments of grace, hands that minister healing, feet that bear good news into a world desperate for hope and grace and peace.

My beloved brothers and sisters, it is indeed a high and lofty and glorious calling that we have received. In this new Church year, this time of renewal after COVID, after 100 years of this parish's life in Dayton, I pray that we may be made worthy of this high calling, and may run with patient endurance and faithfulness the course that the Lord has set before us. But as we said back in May, all this begins simply with coming to Church, and coming on time, as best as we are able. If this is a struggle for us, then we pray that the Lord will grant us strength to struggle indeed, and to grow closer to Him and to one another in the coming months and years.


Home: As you think ahead to our October CCM, please consider making a donation to this very worthy fund raiser. Annually, Philoptochos raises funds to provide financial assistance

Greek Festival is here!

New Hours: Friday and Saturday 11a - 10p & Sunday 12 - 4p

No admission fee this year as we welcome back our Dayton community!

Our fabulous foods we look forward to are coming back: gyro, chicken gyros with marinated shredded chicken; veggie gyros, pastistio, dolmades, and trigona. Athenian Cafe has exciting changes - you will still get saganaki and Greek fries but now you can get lamb chops, souvlaki, hummus & spicy feta dip platter, sausage platter and meatballs. To make room for the extended Athenian Cafe, baklava sundaes and loukamades have been moved to the west side of the church parking lot and we are adding another beer trailer there too! To make room for these booths, the port-a-johns are being moved down the exit driveway next to the Community Center building. In the former Zorba Zone area, we are adding a tent with table and chairs for extra seating.

Exciting changes inside the Memorial Center - Kafenion is now located in the Athenagoras room with room to grow out into the courtyard. New this year, the Kafenion will offer paximathia and floreras (baklava nut roll). The Grecian Boutique will be in the gym along with several vendor booths. The Pastry and Trigona booths will still be located in the gym. New this year, the Pastry Booth will also offer floreras and our diples have a new bow tie shape!

VOLUNTEER INFO BELOW:

Booth chairs have parking passes and wristbands for their workers. Contact your booth chair to get yours. We have volunteer t-shirts this year but only 300 shirts in a variety of sizes. We plan to offer a new shirt annually. Remember, grass parking lot has limited parking - so plan ahead as you may need to look for alternative parking if the lot is full. We are offering free shuttle service from the Grandview employee parking lot located on Shaw Avenue off Forest Avenue. There will also be paid parking at the Masonic (available after 2p on Saturday). The Grandview hospital parking garage is under construction and will not be available this year.

For those of you working in a food area, please follow the food safety guidelines such as gloves, handwashing, etc. that are provided to booths. We want to ensure the food safety of what we are selling. Masks are advisable but optional.

Father Anthony will offer a blessing at the beginning of the festival on Friday. We look forward to seeing everyone here to help in a booth, dancing, church tours, helping behind the scenes - all are appreciated! We wish to extend a welcome to Premier Health Partners who will be providing our First Aid this year. We also will have a small booth at the entrance on Saturday and Sunday from the VA to provide benefit information to veterans.

CATECHISM SCHOOL NEWS



There will be meeting on **September 18** following church with forms and additional details. You must attend the meeting to register.


AIF 2023 BUDGET INPUTS: DEADLINE CHANGE

Candidates for Parish Council

They should lead by example by attending Church and parish events, and regularly participating in the sacramental life of the Church. By doing so, they will have a powerful effect on the overall life of the community. If Parish Council members treat everyone with love and respect, as Christ loves us, then parishioners will do likewise.
