## FOR THE HEALING OF SOUL AND BODY

Beloved in the Lord,

A blessed summer to all of you! I pray that the Lord will keep you safe and grant you every joy in this season. As you travel, or rest, or regroup for the coming fall, please remember the Church in your prayers, and in your continued Stewardship;

you can see where the parish's finances stand in the Stewardship Report.

In the meantime, we are continuing to prepare for the resumption of our Fall ministries here at the Church, and are also continuing to work on a new informational booklet for the parish. We have been using this space to draft some of the elements of this booklet, beginning with basic introductions/ explanations of the services and sacraments of the Church, as a glimpse into the Priest's service book, and a guide to what the clergy can offer to the Faithful. We began with the services and prayers that are done when a child is born, and proceeded to discuss the services of initiation into the Church, with the 40 Day Blessing, Baptism and Chrismation, considering both their meaning and the practicalities of scheduling these services. Last week, we talked about the Eucharist, as the culmination of those sacraments and the cornerstone of the Christian life. From here, we will discuss the other sacraments of the Church, beginning with Holy Unction, and the visitation of the sick.

Christ the Physician of our Souls and Bodies

This sacrament, and the sacrament of Confession, actually are joined by a common thread; in both services, we encounter the Lord as Healer, as the Physician of our souls and bodies. These two sacraments, then, operate in support of the Eucharistic life which we are called to live in communion with the Lord and with all the saints.

The Sacrament of Holy Unction

Holy Unction is a service that we normally see once a year, during Holy Week on Holy Wednesday. The form of the service is fairly simple; in this service, we ask our Lord to bless and sanctify a vessel of olive oil, so that we may be anointed with it "for the healing of soul and body." After a prelude of 35 minutes or so, in which a number of Psalms are read and hymns are sung, 7 Epistle readings, 7 Gospel readings, and 7 Prayers are read over the oil, asking the Lord to consecrate it for our well being. Then the Faithful come forward and are anointed on their face and on their hands.

Holy Unction (Εὐχέλαιον) is a Sacrament of the Church, and is

therefore reserved for baptized & chrismated Orthodox Christians in good standing with the Church. Those who approach should examine their hearts, repenting of their sins, forgiving and praying for their enemies, and seeking the mercy and grace of the Lord. They should hold their hands up, palms facing up, and state their baptismal name; the Priest will say: "Holy Father, Physician of our souls and bodies, heal, forgive, have mercy, and save your servant (*name*)." They will then be urged to rub the oil into their face and hands, and to refrain from washing their hands for about an hour.

The origin of this service is found (together with that of Confession) in the New Testament, in James 5:14-15: "Is anyone among you sick? Let him call for the elders of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise him up. And if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven."

The Challenge of "Unhealed Illnesses"

This promise of "salvation" and "raising up" may sometimes trouble us, because those who are anointed are not always, or even often, healed of their physical ailments. The content of the service, however, helps to resolve the matter. As with all the Sacraments of the Church, Holy Unction is not magic, nor a ritual with a guaranteed outcome. What the service of Holy Unction does is help us to approach the Lord in exactly the same way that the people of Galilee and Judaea approached Him during His ministry. To those who approached Him with repentance & humility, entrusting themselves to His will and mercy, the Lord granted forgiveness of their sins (whether they asked for it or not), and then, as a sign that their sins were forgiven, He often healed their physical ailments. The great problem of human life is actually not sickness, but slavery to sin, and the Lord always grants forgiveness and deliverance to those who seek it. What is necessary for us is that we learn to actually seek this salvation that He gives, and to entrust our lives and our well-being to Him, accepting His will in all things.

Anointing of the Sick Throughout the Year

Once the Unction Oil has been consecrated at the annual service, it is saved and kept respectfully inside the Holy Altar for the remainder of the year; those who are sick, those who are facing surgery, and those who are confined in the hospital or shut in at home may be anointed with it when the Priest visits, or at the Church following the Divine Liturgy or at another time. If they wish to be anointed and to receive Communion (or simply for the Priest to visit), they should contact the Church office to ask the Priest to visit. It should be noted that, while it is necessary for an Orthodox Christian to be conscious to receive Holy Communion, this limitation does not apply to Holy Unction; it is perhaps for this reason that, in the Roman Catholic Church, for many centuries the anointing with Holy Unction came to be associated only with the end of life. But for Orthodox Christians, it has always continued to be used "for the healing of soul and body," as an active prayer seeking the Lord's help, and entrusting our entire being to His mercy and pastoral care.

### STEWARDSHIP REPORT


Last month we reported that our Stewardship Budget is facing a shortfall of \$80,000 versus last year's contributions, which were the basis of our budget for this year. As most of you will have heard from the phone message sent out in late June, we face an additional shortfall from the loss of the revenue of the full Festival. We need to all pull together to weather the challenges of this year.

As we said last month: "If you have not made a pledge, please consider doing so. If you have made a pledge, please consider pledging a little more. Use the stewardship envelopes in the pews! Make a weekly budget and put in a little \$ each week." Or, if you prefer to manage these things electronically, there are many options available via the Church website:

One interesting thing about this year's stewardship numbers is that, while the amount pledged shows a significant shortfall, the amount of stewardship actually paid has not declined nearly as much. The stewardship committee is not sure how to interpret this puzzle. Have some stewards forgotten to fill out pledge cards? Making a documented pledge is important for our parish budgeting, so if you have not yet made your 2023 pledge, please do so.

For the month of May, twelve additional stewards pledged \$12,665. Thank you to everyone who has made a pledge or increased their pledge this year. We want your feedback – if you have any questions, comments, or concerns about stewardship or our parish finances, please reach out to any member of the Stewardship Committee or of the Parish Council.

### FESTIVAL NEWS

## Fall Festival Postponement (re-printed from earlier months with updates)

In October of last year, the Festival Board of Directors began the work of planning for this year's Festival. The most important work was identifying and filling the most critical festival leadership positions. Despite every effort, these roles still remained unfilled through the fall and early winter. In December the Festival Board of Directors sent out a Festival update to the entire community; in that update, the Board was clear that if we could not fill these roles, it would be impossible to plan and successfully execute a Festival in 2023.

Unfortunately, these roles remained unfilled in January of this year. In addition, as the planning efforts proceeded, it became clear that we faced other critical challenges. Even as of this date, the critical electrical upgrade required to hold a Festival remains unresolved (we ordered the parts last fall, but its arrival and installation have been delayed). Further, we have not yet been able to identify replacements for the essential equipment, especially the refrigerator trucks, which our food suppliers are no longer willing or able to provide.

For these three reasons, the Parish Council accepted the recommendation of the Festival Board of Directors to delay our next Dayton Greek Festival until 2024. To replace the lost revenue, maintain our volunteer base, and retain our claim to our Fall Festival date, we planned on two Drive-Thru Festivals, one from May 5-7, and one on our normal Festival weekend, from September 8-10. (see below)

If you can help us to solve any of the challenges that must be resolved before September 2024, please contact the Parish Council or the Festival Board of Directors as soon as possible. Regardless, please volunteer for the preparation and execution of these two Drive-Thrus.
