WHY DO YOU CALL ME LORD?

Last time, we were talking about God's revelation of His Name to Moses on Mount Sinai, and what His Name means - The One Who Is. As we make our transition to the 2nd clause of the

Creed, moving from the Father to the Son, we see that the first thing we say about the Son is that He is Lord - it reads: "And I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ..." So why do we call Him Lord? To answer this, we need to look a little more at the Name of God revealed on Mount Sinai, and how it was used by the people to whom it was given over the centuries that passed between this revelation and the birth of Jesus Christ.

In the course of the history of the Hebrew people, as time passed after the establishment of the Covenant between God and the people of Israel, a number of practical traditions developed concerning the details of religious life. One of these involved the use of the Name by which God called Himself on Mount Sinai. By the third century before Christ's birth, the Hebrew people considered it to be too holy for them to use. When they spoke about God, they would use other names in place of the Holy Name given on Mount Sinai. Even when reading Holy Scripture, they would replace The Name with the Hebrew word "Adonai," which means "Lord."

This usage has been carried over into translation - first in the Greek, where The Name of God was in most cases not translated literally into Ω , The One Who Exists, but instead as $K \dot{\nu} \varrho \iota \sigma \varsigma$, the Greek word for Lord. As a side-note, English Bibles generally use this same convention - wherever the Name of God is used in the Hebrew original, the English text uses the word LORD, usually in all capital letters, to show that it is a placeholder for the Hebrew Name of God.

Now, we are very used to calling Jesus Christ "Lord." Throughout the New Testament, the Orthodox Divine Liturgy, and even our daily speech and prayers, we are almost more likely to call Him Lord than we are use the name Jesus, or Christ. But it is important that this familiarity should not breed contempt - when we call Jesus "Lord," we are affirming a great wonder and mystery. The God Who Exists, the Most-High God, has not only revealed Himself to us, but has become flesh, and dwelt among us. His Name is Jesus, and He is the Messiah, the Christ, the Anointed One.

This is why we call Him Lord. But this is not simply a theological point. Jesus assures us of this Himself in Luke chapter 6 when He asks His followers, "Why do you call me Lord, Lord, but do not do the things that I say? Whoever comes to me, and hears my words, and does them, is like a

And He goes on to say that whoever hears Him, but doesn't do what He says, is like a house with no foundation, which cannot hold together.

This is more than a demand for obedience - the Lord, The One Who Is, our Creator, God Most High, Jesus Christ, is telling us the central truth of our existence. If we are in good relationship with Him, the house that we build, our very life and existence, is unshakeable, because He, the Lord, the One Who Is, is Existence Himself, the Rock of our Salvation. If we do not listen to Him, and do not live according to His words, then we are cutting ourselves off from the source of life and of being. In Him, and Him alone, do we live, and move, and have our being. Without Him, we are lost. He is the Lord our God, and He has become man.

If we look around the Church, we see this basic point affirmed everywhere. Not only in the words that we say, and the prayers that we pray, but in the icons as well. Every Orthodox icon of Jesus Christ affirms that He is God Most High, the One Who Is - for in every icon, there is around His head a halo, and inside the halo is a cross. On the three bars of the Cross are written the three letters of the Name of God in Greek. ——O Ω N. O Ω To The One Who Is.

Jesus Himself affirms this truth, most clearly in John 8:56, where He says to those who are questioning Him, "Your father Abraham rejoiced to see my day: and he saw it, and was glad." And they replied, surprised, "You aren't even fifty years old, and you're telling us that you have seen Abraham?" And Jesus replies, "Truly, truly, I say unto you, Before Abraham was, I am." And with this "I Am," He repeats the same affirmation of His Infinite Existence that He had spoken long before to Moses on Mount Sinai.

So we see that in every possible way, the Church affirms this truth: Jesus Christ is God Most High, the One Who Is, Who created the world, Who called Abraham, and spoke to Moses and delivered the children of Israel from bondage in Egypt. He is God, The Lord, the One Who Is. And when we ourselves call Him Lord, we assent to this truth, and confess the central mystery of the Christian Faith. The Infinite One has limited Himself, the Creator has entered into His Creation, the Bodiless One clothes Himself in our flesh. He is our light, our life, and our salvation. His name is Jesus, and He is the Christ, the Messiah, the Anointed One. So next time, we will consider what these names mean.

The above is the tenth installment of the basic Catechetical Program with which we ask all our Catechumens to engage. As these matters are certainly of general interest, we will be publishing them here for the next several months; comments and questions are welcome, and may be directed to Fr. Anthony.

BAPTISMAL DIVINE LITURGY - AUGUST 10TH

Beloved in the Lord,

As the Lord has blessed us with more catechumens than our parish has seen in its entire history, we have found ourselves reaching back into the ancient history of the Church to find the manner in which our forebears in the Faith received the masses of the Roman Empire into the embrace of the Body of Christ. We have therefore resumed the ancient practice of using the great Fasts of the Nativity and Great Lent, as well as the 15 Days of August, for the preparation of the catechumens, and the great Feasts of Theophany, Pascha, and Transfiguration as the occasion to bring them into the Church.

This will result in some changes to the order of services this coming Sunday, August 10th, the Sunday after the Feast of Transfiguration, which will be as follows.

Chrismations on August 9th at 5 pm

On Saturday, August 9th, we will do the service of Great Vespers, at 5 pm. At the beginning of the service, we will conduct the Catechesis Service, in which those who are preparing for baptism will receive the prayers of exorcism, will renounce Satan, and pledge themselves to Christ. These are the prayers that we usually see during a baptism in the Narthex, at the beginning of the service. Then we will proceed with the Great Vespers, and towards the end, we will conduct the Chrismation Service for those catechumens who are being received into the Church by Chrismation, for the seal of the gift of the Holy Spirit. At this service, they will be Chrismated and Tonsured, and will receive their Baptismal Cross. The Vespers service, including these elements, should take about an hour and a half.

Baptisms during the Liturgy on August 10th

On Sunday, August 10th, we will begin the Orthros early, at 7:45 am, so that we can begin the Divine Liturgy at 9 am. This will be a Baptismal Liturgy, a joyous and beautiful event which we have seen only twice before, on January 5th and on April 12th (Lazarus Saturday) of this year. We will begin with the Great Litany, as normal but the Antiphons at the beginning of the service will be replaced by the Baptism and Chrismation of the Catechumens who have been preparing themselves during the Lenten Fast.

After the Newly-Illumined have been baptized and chrismated, the clergy will say the Prayers for the Entrance and for the Trisagion Hymn while the Newly Illumined get dressed and the Chanters sing the hymns of the day, and we will then process around the Font, and then from the Baptistry out to the Narthex and back down the center aisle of the Church, as we all sing: "As many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ" in place of the normal Trisagion Hymn.

The Newly-Illumined will then take their place with their godparents in the front several pews on the left, and we will continue with Epistle and the Gospel (we will actually read two of each, one for the Feast and one for the Baptism), and then with the rest of the Divine Liturgy as normal. The Newly-Illumined will, of course, approach first for Holy Communion when the time arrives.

After Holy Communion, we will do the Memorial Service and any other necessary services, and then we will remove the Chrism from the Newly Illumined, Tonsure them, and give them their baptismal crosses, and will then conclude the service.

We will be chrismating 14 souls on Saturday evening, and will be baptizing 15 souls on Sunday. We anticipate that the service will take 45 minutes longer than usual, not counting the additional time for the Memorial Service and other services. We appreciate your presence and your joy in welcoming these newest members of the flock of the Good Shepherd, our Lord Jesus Christ.

Thank you all, and may every blessing of the Lord attend you and your families in these holy days.

THE CATECHUMENATE AT ANNUNCIATION DAYTON

from Fr. Anthony

The ancient Christian title for those who have undertaken to become Orthodox Christians is "Catechumen." A Catechumen is a member of the Church, and is entitled to burial as an Orthodox Christian should they die before their baptism or chrismation, but catechumens do not participate in the sacraments or in the government of the parish until after their initiation.

To become a catechumen, an inquirer must have been faithful in attendance at the Sunday Liturgy and at the Monday Adult Catechesis class for at least two months. They must have become a pledged member of the Church, and provided to the parish priest an account of their life, and the path that has brought them to the Orthodox Faith. They must have identified a potential sponsor, an adult member of the parish community who has been an Orthodox Christian for at least five years, and preferably for ten years. Once they have completed these requirements, the Church will make them Catechumens by means of the prayer of the 8th Day, usually read for infants along with the prayers of the 40-Day Blessing.

The period of dedicated inquiry and the catechumenate together must last a minimum of one year, but it will frequently last a year and a half, or as much as two years. During that time, the Catechumens will continue to attend Divine Liturgy faithfully each week, along with the Adult Catechesis class Monday evening, and will develop their connection with the parish family through social fellowship at Coffee Hour, service to one another and to the parish family by participating in the hosting of Coffee Hour and the many other tasks involved in daily parish life, by volunteering at the Festival and other parish fundraisers, and by joining in the various outreach ministries of the parish community.

Once that time has been fulfilled, the catechumens are received into the Church by Chrismation, if they have been baptized previously in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, in a church confession which affirms the Nicene Faith in the Holy Trinity, and can provide written documentation of this baptism. If they have never been baptized, then they will be received by Holy Baptism during the Divine Liturgies of the Feast of Theophany, the Saturday of Lazarus, or the Sunday after the Transfiguration. After their baptism, they become full members of the Church, a gift and blessing of the Lord to our community, even as we have been permitted by the Lord to be blessings to them as they find us and join themselves with us.




